

USATAA-TA PRACTITIONER CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

OVERVIEW

The TAP Certification Training Program was begun by the United States Association for Transactional Analysis in order to give recognition to those who are using Transactional Analysis in their work without having to go through the 4-5 years of training that is required to become a Certified Transactional Analyst (CTA) in the International Transactional Association. TAP can be thought of as a preliminary step to CTA for those wanting to pursue that certification or as a stand-alone certification for those who want to be certified as a TA Practitioner.

There are three levels to the program: learning the theory and methods of Transactional Analysis (TAP); practicing application of the theory and methods (TAAP); and becoming a teacher of the theory and methods (TAPI).

LEVEL I: TAP (CERTIFIED TRANSACTIONAL ANALYSIS PRACTITIONER)

TAP Requirements

1. Sign a training agreement with a TA Practitioner Instructor. [TAP Training Agreement](#).
2. TA 101 Course or 6-hour Introduction to Transactional Analysis Theory
3. Completion of four additional modules on the application of TA (or the Equivalent) (50 hours minimum)
4. Endorsement of instructor that participant has completed all the approved learning objectives for the TA Practitioner Certificate.
5. Membership in USATAA.
6. Apply to USATAA for Certificate & Pay Fee (\$50)
7. Taught by TAPI, CTA (with certification to teach the TA 101), PTSTA, TSTA, or Diplomate in Redecision Therapy with a TAPI Certificate.
8. Awareness of and agreement with the USATAA Code of Ethics.

Note: Certified TA 101 Instructors may include additional material from the approved 101 Outline and may endorse the TA Practitioner as meeting International Transactional Analysis Association's requirements for completion of the TA 101.

Learning Objectives for the TAP Modules

Part 1: Introductory Keynote (2 contact hrs)

By the end of this course participants will be able to:

1. List three transactional analysis concepts
2. Describe three ways TA can be applied in a counseling practice, classroom or organization.

Part 2: TA Basics (at least 6 contact hrs)

By the end of this course the participants will be able to:

1. Name the three ego states
2. Describe the functioning of each ego state
3. Describe one way that rackets develop
4. Describe three different types of transactions
5. Describe the predictable transactional patterns called games
6. Identify positive and negative strokes
7. Describe two possible childhood influences on life patterns or scripts

Part 3: Foundational Modules (at least 12 contact hrs per module)

In the first four modules, participants learn to apply Transactional Analysis theory in their own lives and to begin to use it in their practices. Additional advanced modules focus on application of Transactional Analysis theory.

Module 1

Personality and Ego States: Structural Analysis

By the end of this course participants will be able to:

1. Explain the influence of introjected/internal parent ego states in their life
2. Use four ways of diagnosing ego states
3. Describe the development of each ego state
4. Construct an ego-gram
5. Identify a change they want to make in their own ego-gram
6. Identify at least three strengths in each ego state
7. Draw Berne's second order diagram of the Child and Parent ego states
8. Draw a diagram showing subdivisions of functional Child and Parent ego states
9. Identify two strengths related to Nurturing Parent, Controlling or Critical Parent, Adapted Child, and Free Child

Module 2

Transactions, Strokes and Transactional Intervention in Conflicts. By the end of this course participants will be able to:

1. Differentiate complementary, crossed, and ulterior transactions
2. Name two advantages related to each of the above three types of transactions
3. Name two disadvantages related to each of the above three types of transactions
4. Use crossed transactions to change the course of conversations
5. Use positive unconditional strokes appropriately
6. Use positive conditional strokes appropriately
7. Use healthy negative conditional strokes appropriately
8. Name at least three ways of structuring time
9. Describe two ways to invite people to change how they structure time
10. Use one way to intervene transactionally to solve conflicts

Module 3

Habitual Painful Feelings (Rackets), and Destructive Patterns (Games)

By the end of this course participants will be able to:

1. Use two ways to invite change in beliefs that support painful feelings
2. Explain the connection between old patterns of thinking and feeling and current thinking/feeling patterns
3. Identify two common destructive interactional patterns that lead to painful feelings (games)
4. List two ways to intervene in games
5. Identify two ways to show the interaction patterns in games
6. Identify the three positions in the Karpman drama triangle and
7. Describe an alternative behavior to replace each of the three positions in the Karpman drama triangle
8. Explain each of the existential life positions
9. Identify at least two games in which they have been involved

Module 4

Life Patterns or Scripts

By the end of this course participants will be able to:

1. Explain how habitual painful feeling patterns (rackets) and destructive interactional patterns (games) advance limiting or self-destructive life patterns
2. Explain the difference between an injunction and a counter injunction

3. List two ways that early life decisions impact adult life
4. Explain how positive and negative script decisions develop
5. Use script analysis to understand their own life patterns,
6. Explain three ways to facilitate changing script decisions that are experienced as negative
7. List two ways that using transactional analysis can help clients understand their thoughts, feelings, and behavior
8. Explain how to facilitate script change using Redecision Therapy
9. Explain how to facilitate script change using stroke theory

Note: In order to use transactional analysis in practice, individuals should have completed the necessary training in their field or discipline and have the appropriate legal authorization to practice in that field.

LEVEL II: TAAP (CERTIFIED TRANSACTIONAL ANALYSIS ADVANCED PRACTITIONER)

TAAP Requirements

1. TAP Certificate
2. Membership in USATAA
3. Signed training agreement with a qualified TAPI.
4. Awareness of and agreement with the USATAA Code of Ethics
5. At least one academic year of supervision of the application of TA by a TAPI (who has training in supervision), PTSTA, or TSTA (50 hours minimum)
6. Endorsement of Supervisor
7. Apply to USATAA for Certificate and Pay Fee (\$75).

LEVEL III: TAPI (CERTIFIED TRANSACTIONAL ANALYSIS PRACTITIONER INSTRUCTOR)

TAPI Requirements

1. Be a TAAP
2. Membership in USATAA
3. Signed training agreement with a qualified TAPI.
4. Have at least a masters degree or equivalent experience in your field of education

5. Assist in teaching and supervising two complete TAP Certification Programs under the Supervision of the TAP Instructor (TAPI)
6. Endorsement of Supervising Instructor and Supervisor
7. Apply to USATAA for Certificate and Pay Fee (\$100).
8. Awareness of and agreement with the USATAA Code of Ethics.

CTAs with certification to teach the TA 101, PTSTAs or TSTAs may apply directly for the TAPI.
